#### 1. Course Description

This course provides the opportunity to understand Korean entertainment media, particularly focusing on industry logics. First, we talk about the recent developments happening in K-pop music industry (such as NewJeans) from the perspective of the history of K-pop Idol industry. Second, we will discuss K-contents, from the production to distribution. K-contents means that we will talk about Non-Fiction Program (such as variety show) and Fiction program (such as K-drama or movie).
