I. Course Overview

1. Course Description

This course provides students to gain a comprehensive understanding of the fundamental history of Korean ceramics during the Silla (57 B.C. – 935 A.D.), and Joseon (1392 – 1910) periods. Working with clay, students will explore the distinctive decorative techniques used during each era.

This course aims to deepen students' understanding of the significance of ceramics in Korean culture and society. Students will explore the functional aspects of pottery across different historical periods in Korea, studying the evolution of Korean ceramics to appreciate the unique styles and cultural influences that have shaped this art form. Through hands-on experiences and guides instruction, students will learn traditional techniques such as surface decoration, glazing, and firing methods. By the end of the course, students will have gained a solid foundation in the history, techniques, and cultural context of Korean ceramics, as well as the opportunity to create their own ceramic pieces using the knowledge and skills acquired throughout the course.
